#### 1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Curriculum and Educational Culture ? Every Academic year in the college begins with a briefing of the students by the principal. ? This is followed by an orientation programme which students attend along with their parents. It includes a PPT presentation of one hour - a journey through the vision and mission of the college since its inception in 1957, along with the activities of various clubs such as the Nature Club, Extension Club, Women's Cell, Film Club, Science Club, Mathematics Association, Social Science Association, English and Malayalam Associations along with the celebration of Important National Days. (Independence Day, National Integration Day, Gandhi Jayanti, Quit India Day, Republic Day, and Human Rights Day). ? This programme is phenomenal in the sense that it gives the parents as well as the students a clear outline of the curricular and co-curricular activities of the college, expected learning outcomes, course objectives and what is expected from them. ? Along with pedagogic content knowledge, techno pedagogic content knowledge and Entrepreneurship education are also given importance Curriculum Reflection and Management ? The University of Kerala revised the Bed curriculum in 2019 with the curriculum vision of empowering prospective teachers with value embedded and competency based teacher education. ? A sincere attempt was made by the college to ensure that the objectives of the revised Bed curriculum is implemented in the college through qualitative multi-level strategies. ? Workshops, seminars and training sessions were arranged involving reputed trainers focusing on skill development, communication skills, ICT, gender education, yoga , disability and inclusive education ? In pursuance of the university academic calendar, a college academic calendar is prepared which provides teachers and students a working knowledge of how the institution is planning to function in the ensuing academic year. ? The academic calendar gives a clear idea of the working days, the distribution of school based, college based and community based activities. ? The probable dates of school internship, practice teaching sessions, house wise arts competitions, sports day, field trips and college excursions, seminars to be organized, invited lectures etc. ? Based on the academic calendar, a Timetable is prepared by the college academic council ensuring that all activities mentioned in academic calendar gets materialized by assigning appropriate date and time. ? The Time Table is discussed in the staff council and all decisions are taken democratically. ? The principal periodically confirms whether the progress of the curricular and co-curricular activities is in tune with the academic calendar. ? The suggestions from P.T.A, Alumni and students are wholeheartedly received and necessary modifications are made in the academic calendar.? . In

the timetable, distribution of faculty work load and time allotted to each subject is strictly in accordance with the university norms. ? The time table is also discussed in the staff council and constructive suggestions of students are accepted and necessary changes incorporated. ? The final timetable is displayed in the student notice board, library, staff room and optional classes. Students are encouraged to keep a personal copy of time table. . ? A teaching plan is prepared by each faculty at the beginning of the academic year giving equal weightage to curricular and co-curricular programs. ? Curriculum is transacted primarily through lectures, Tutorials, Seminars, Group Discussions, Practical works, Contact Hours, Library sessions, Assignments, Debates, community centered projects and practicums. ? Along with content-based pedagogy, social and emotional learning is given importance with focus on affective and psychomotor capabilities such as self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, Relationship skills and Responsible decision making. ? During practice teaching sessions, teachers visit the schools and observes at least three classes of the trainee's. The marks are recorded in the class observation dairy. ? The daily progress of content, activities and programs are recorded in the Teachers dairy. The quality of the curriculum transaction is monitored by the IQAC at periodic intervals and corrective suggestions are given. ? The quality of teaching-learning is assessed periodically through formative assessments such as class test, mid semester examinations. This helps to locate the gaps in the student's cognitive structure and also identify slow learners, and gifted children. ? The mentors conduct personal counselling sessions with slow learners and after understanding their needs, provision is made for Remedial coaching and Peer Tutoring. Curriculum, Cohort and Community ? The formal curricular programme begins with an informal get together of teachers and students named- OFF The Beaten Track - usually arranged outside the college, within its immediate community, near the banks of the Pampa River or a local heritage site in Aranmula. ? This programme besides providing teachers and students a wonderful opportunity to know each other, sensitize them to the immediate community where the college is situated, its unique and rich cultural heritage and the needs of the community. ? The needs of gifted children are also addressed by assigning them charge of Co-curricular activities in the college, community centered which undertakes the task of cleaning bus stations, market places, riverbanks and hospital wards. ? The college has taken the initiative of setting up and maintaining a library in an orphanage for children-Balasramam nearby at Aranmula . ? As a part of their community based activity students participated in a community living camp at Mitra Niketan- a model school and training center based on Mahatma Gandhi's NaiThalim- Experiential learning philosophy providing formal education and skill training to more than 100 students belonging to tribal community and has collaborations with many foreign universities

#### Feedback Obtained

Feedback from Students Action Taken 1. The students are quite anxious about the online exam in the fourth semester. It was decided to provide additional online practice sessions and student were encouraged to do practice questions by downloading them from the college and university website. 2. Reduce the traditional practice of writing 40 lesson plans in the third semester. Instead E-content development to be emphasized. The students were to be given training in E-content development and students were to develop the same 3. The time available in the fourth semester for project is not sufficient. Students are facing great difficulty in completing the record works and project simultaneously. Teaches were directed to start the project work in the third semester itself so that students get sufficient time. Moreover proper orientation to report writing to be given, 4. The M.Ed. students have difficulty in completing their thesis because of overloading of syllabus The matter was brought to the notice of the P.G. Board of Studies. 5. Difficulty in publishing research papers in approved journals of Education. Orientation on how to prepare good research projects were arranged. 6. Information on approved Research Fellowships and how to apply. Expert interaction with research experts

were arranged Feedback from Teachers Action Taken 1.M.Ed Students need more training and classes on how to prepare good research projects A 3-day National Seminar on the topic - Focus on Multi Methodological Designs of Research was conducted from 12-14 of Feb 2020, 2. Students to receive training in how to effectively use ICT tools and know how to make the best use of E-library facilities. The facilities in the library to be improved. 3. The content load of the General papers in B.Ed. syllabus is too high Very little time is available for co-curricular activities. The matter was brought to the notice of the Board of Studies members. 4. The curriculum to include E-content development and communication skills to prepare student teachers for international student community. The matter was brought to the notice of the P.G. Board of Studies. 5. Difficulty in publishing research papers in approved journals of Education for both teachers and students. It was decided to bring to the notice of the UGC of the shortage of approved journals in Education. 6. More collaboration with reputed Indian, foreign universities and colleges needed. The college council decided to conduct seminars in collaboration with other reputed universities in the next academic year. The IQAC coordinator was entrusted this responsibility. Feedback from Alumni Action Taken 1. The library facilities to be increased and latest books to be included. The college applied for RUSA fund for modernizing the library. 2. E- library facilities to be provided and students to be encouraged to use them. The Alumni promised all help in improving the facilities of the college. 3. Student exchange programs to be implemented to provide students a wider exposure. The college decided to join hands with the student and teacher exchange programme initiated by the UGC and MHRD. 4. The curriculum needs to be upgraded to prepare teachers for international student community. More training sessions on ICT tools and improving the communication skills were carried out. 5. More collaboration with reputed Indian and foreign universities and colleges needed. Information about National and International fellowships were displayed in the college notice board and WhatsApp groups of teachers and students. Feedback from Employers Action Taken 1. The schools participating in the placement cell expressed happiness in the performance of the students of this college. The principal and staff council expressed gratitude to the school managements for their sincere comments. 2. Many students recruited from this college are working successfully in the neighboring schools. The college appreciated the sincere work of their Alumni in upholding the integrity and good will of this institution. 3. The students to be trained to handle special children with dyslexia, dyscalculia problems. It was decided to conduct training classes by expert psychologists and educational experts. 4. Students need to be familiarized with CBSE syllabus also to improve their chances of employment. The staff council decided to include CBSE schools in the list of approved schools for practice teaching. Feedback from Parents Action Taken 1. The 80 of parents expressed happiness in the quality of teaching learning and co-curricular activities of this college. The principal and staff council expressed gratitude to the PTA for all their support. 2. The functioning of placement cell to be strengthened by ensuring the participation of more schools and support from Alumni. The decision was taken in the staff meeting to ensure participation of more schools. 3. Students to be given guidance with respect to the choices in future courses, capacity building programs to be initiated. It was decided to conduct more tutorial and mentoring sessions and also invite career counsellors to the campus. 4. It would be good if mock-interviews and group discussions are arranged for the final year students as it will boost their self-confidence and their employability. Directions were given to mentors and optional teachers to arrange mock interviews and discussions.

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#### 2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

In every academic year, an academic calendar is drawn up, which is strictly adhered to and its effective implementation is ensured. The academic activities are planned for each semester and as part of the evaluation of the effective implementation of the proposed activities the follow-up of the activities are carried out in each semester. The theoretical and practical aspects of both programs offered (M.Ed and B.Ed) were addressed. Maximum care is taken to promote student-centered classes and student progress is monitored through an ongoing internal assessment process and focus is given to instill quality teaching and research culture in students. Assessment of students is based on their attendance, careful efforts on assignments, seminars, etc., and performance on class tests, mid-semester exams, and model exams, etc. Due to the pandemic situation, this year slight reforms in evaluation processes are brought out including online assignments. Other activities are also incorporated in the evaluation process which include capacity building programmes, school based and community-based activities, peer teaching, field work, practicum, participation in intercollegiate competitions. In addition to the above mentioned evaluation techniques the Post-Graduate students, are evaluated on the basis of self-development programmes (SDC). In case of postgraduate students weightage is given for self development course which include seven categories namely yoga, working with community, communication and Academic Writing, gender issues: awareness and management, practices promoting eco friendliness, Career Development and Participation in Rural Reconstruction

and Social Welfare in collaboration with LSG. The competencies of students are assessed on the basis of seminars, assignments, participation in activities, presentation of reports etc. The competency in theoretical aspects is assessed through regular tests, the students receive regular feedback and there are constant discussions about the test results for their improvement. Tutorials and mentoring sessions will help identify the difficulties and take corrective action. Materials and aids are made available to those in need and changes are monitored and queried. The practical aspects are also taken into account. Students are initially trained through discussions, demonstrations, training in micro-lessons, etc. followed by criticism classes and suggestions and corrections for improvement. The pupils then gain practical experience in a real school environment through an induction programme to school (5 days) and two sessions practice teaching stretching for 10 weeks each in the third and fourth semesters . These tangible experiences are used for correction, evaluation and improvement. The classes are observed by the faculty including teachers handling general subjects and mentoring teachers in the schools. The evaluation is based on specific evaluation criteria. Prompt feedback is given to enhance the quality of teaching. For the evaluation of and promotion of research culture of students internal evaluation of a research project followed by an external viva voce for B. Ed students and an internal evaluation of theses of M. Ed students followed by external viva voce are strictly conducted. Internal marks are published and displayed before each semester exam. An external online examination in the final semester for multiple choice questions mark the final evaluation for which the students are evaluated internally in every semester.

# 2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The staff prepared a detailed academic calendar prior to the start of the class and clearly defined a detailed plan of action for all academic endeavors, including exams. This time-bound preparation and stringent execution aid in the effective completion of programmes without time lapses or other instructional disruptions. The prepared academic calendar serves as a solid foundation for constructing an activity-packed academic year. The calendar for the academic year 2019-2020 was created with specifics of events to be carried out between June 1st 2019 and March 31st 2020. The college reopened on 6th June 2019. International Yoga Day was observed on 21 June as mentioned in the academic plan. Admission procedures for B.Ed and M.Ed were completed on 28 June 2019.new batches started on July 1 2019. PTA meeting was organized on July 3 itself as decided. Induction programme for the new comers was arranged on 10 July 2019.As previously planned Quit India day was observed on August 8 2019. Community living camp was organized from 26 August to 30 August 2019 as per the curricular planning. Teachers Day was celebrated on the 5th of September this year, as is customary. The auspicious festival of Kerala, 'Onam' was celebrated in a grand manner on 5th September 2019 as is customary. A workshop on Yoga was held on 12 September 2019. SDC workshop for third semester M.Ed students started on 17 September 2019 and simultaneously first semester M.Ed students undergone midterm examination. Schedule for Arts festival was strictly followed and competitions were carried out on 27 and 28 of September 2019. This years Gandhi Jayanthi was celebrated on October 2nd, as usual. Two-day arts day celebration was on the 3rd and 4th of October 2019. SDC workshop and yoga performance test followed on the 3rd and 10th of October respectively. Strictly adhering to the academic calendar Model Examinations for both B.Ed and third semester M.Ed were conducted on 15 and 16 October 2019. M.Ed internship was initiated on 22 October and model exam for first semester students started on the same day. University exams for 3rd semester M.Ed students commenced on 30 October 2019. Pathakadinam was celebrated with flag hoisting and oath taking. University Examination for the third semester M.Ed commenced on November 2019.

So, the oath taking of union members scheduled on that day was shifted to 27 November. Fourth semester M.Ed classes began on 5 November 2019 and simultaneously model exam for first semester M.Ed was conducted as scheduled from 5 November to 9 November. 15th November M.Ed students attended a national seminar organized by Department of Education, Thiruvananthapuram. University examination for first semester M.Ed students commenced on 16 November and continued till 23 as per the University Calendar. University examination for B.Ed started on November 23 itself following the calendar. On December 1 World Aids Day was observed as pre planned. A study class on 'Padayani', the traditional art form of Kerala, was organized on 18 December 2019 New year was celebrated with special programmes on the new year day. 'Mannam Jayanthi' was celebrated this year also, as usual on the 2nd of January 2020. Special programmes were conducted on 12 January as part of National Youth Day. As it is routinely celebrated, this year also Republic Day celebrations were planned and organized on 26th of January 2020. College day was celebrated on February 7 2020. Union inauguration and Arts club inauguration were conducted on February 19, 2020. National Science Day was observed on 28 February 2020. Due to the covid pandemic, classes were suspended on 9 March 2020. In addition to the activities mentioned in the calendar, some other activities carried out were also included. Despite the disturbances due to the pandemic, the schedule prepared in the academic calendar is followed in an extensive manner for the smooth conduct of all the academic programmes including examinations.

The college has efficient system for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities-laboratory, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. Library is divided into reading and reference sections. All students can use the reading room and reference space according to their requirements. The library has a physical and digital catalogue system. Each optional class is allotted a time slot for borrowing books. Each optional class has an optional library where all the essential books are kept. Library contains books and theses donated by teachers and students. Students also donate books to the optional library. Laboratory facilities are available for science students. Every year chemicals and apparatus and other objects required for lab activities are purchased. Students are given sufficient time for conducting experiments in the lab. Computer lab is utilized by the students as required. Online examinations are conducted in the computer lab with 25

students at a time. Hands on practice are given during technology classes.

Psychology labs are made available to students to conduct psychological experiments. Each optional subject has a method lab which offers facility for the students to conduct optional experiments. The college uses a stadium which is common for all the institutions in the campus. It contains one shuttle badminton court. Facilities for table tennis and caroms are also available in the college. Individual champions are awarded to the best performance individually during athletic meet. The college has established a guidance and counseling room and is made available for guidance and counseling of students. Placement centre functioning in the institution helps the student to find out employment opportunities. Schools in the locality recruit our trainees/our sister concerns are a regular source of placement. Biometric Punching system has been introduced. Separate systems were introduced for faculty and students. Renovation and construction works were started using RUSA fund.
